### **First Annual Winter Bonfire**

The Califon Volunteer Fire Company is excited to announce the first annual winter bonfire on Saturday, Jan. 22 (with a snow date of Saturday, Jan. 29) at the Califon Carnival Grounds. The bonfire will take place from 4-8pm and will include a fireworks show and ice skating (weather permitting) as well as food and refreshments—including a beer tent. Donations will be accepted at the bonfire to cover the cost of fireworks.

All Califon residents, please note—your Christmas trees will be the fuel for the fire at this year's bonfire. The fire company will be picking up your trees curbside and then transporting them to the carnival grounds for the bonfire. Curbside tree pick-up will take place Saturday, Jan. 15, so have your tree ready and waiting to be hauled away. There's really no

better way to recycle your tree this year and have some fun with your neighbors at the same time!

### **Free Annual Rabies Clinic**

The Califon Board of Health will be sponsoring its annual Rabies Clinic for dogs and cats Saturday, Jan. 15, from noon until 3pm at the Borough of Califon's Municipal Building, 39 Academy Street, in Califon. The clinic will take place in the old Police Bays. As in years past, the clinic will once again be provided for free to Califon residents. In the event of snow, the clinic will be rescheduled for the following Saturday, Jan. 22—same time, same place.

Please note the state of New Jersey requires you to provide proof of a rabies vaccination before a license will be issued. Contact Karen Mastro, Dog Registrar, (908) 832-7850 ext. 204, with any questions.

### When the Snow Falls This Winter...

The Califon First Aid Squad and Califon Volunteer Fire Company would like to send a reminder to all residents of our community, particularly when it snows. Be sure your houses are clearly marked and visible from the road with a house or mailbox number. Please help make it easier for responders to find you in the event of an emergency.

Please also note the following rules that will go into effect in the event of snow in the borough: Owner(s) and/or tenant(s) of any property abutting public roads of the borough shall remove all snow and ice from sidewalks and gutters of roads within 12 hours of daylight after snow has fallen and accumulated. A summons will be issued to violators. Placing snow and/or ice in the borough roadways, whether paved or unpaved, is strictly prohibited.

Whenever snow has covered borough streets and an emergency exists, no vehicles can park on the streets until they have been plowed sufficiently. At that time, parking on the streets will resume so long as it does interfere with the normal flow of traffic. Violators of these rules may have their cars towed at owner's expense.

### It's Time To License Your Dog!



A reminder to all Califon residents— 2011 dog licenses are due by Monday, Jan. 31, 2011. Licenses may be obtained at Borough Hall, 39 Acad-

emy Street, during the hours of 9am until 3pm, Monday through Thursday.

Applications for dog licenses also are available on the Borough's website, www.califonboro.net under Forms. Print out and complete the application and mail it with along with a proof of rabies vaccination

certificate and a veterinarian's certificate or notarized affidavit stating the dog has been altered. Please include a check payable to Califon Dog Account. The fee is \$11 for a dog that has been altered and \$14 for an unaltered dog.

Please note there is a delinquent fine of \$5 per dog, per month, after January 31.

# Wood-Burning Heat Sources are Beautiful— **But They Can Be Dangerous**

You might have read a Dec. 16 press release from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) outlining the dangers of wood-burning heat sources in our homes. We thought the press release was important enough to reiterate here. According to the

article, DEP Assistant Commissioner Nancy Wittenberg states, "If you are going to use a fireplace, wood stove, or even a wood boiler, there are some steps you can take to minimize your impact on the environment, your neighbors, and your own health."

A properly installed wood-burning appliance should be smoke-free, according to the federal Environmental Protection Agency. If you see or smell smoke, that might be a sign of a problem.

Keep in mind these safety precautions when burning wood in a stove or fireplace for a safer, cleaner fire:

- Allow wood to season for at least six months before burning it. Seasoned wood is darker, has cracks in the end grain and sounds hollow when smacked against another piece of wood.
- Wood burns most efficiently when its moisture content is below 20 percent; wood moisture meters can be purchased to test the moisture content.
- Store wood outdoors, stacked neatly off the ground with the top covered.
- Start fires with newspaper and dry kindling and keep them burning hot.
- Regularly remove ashes to ensure proper airflow.
- Never burn garbage, cardboard, plastics, wrapping materials, or painted materials.
- Remember to keep anything flammable including drapes, furniture, newspapers, and books far away from any wood-burning appliance.
- Keep a fire extinguisher close by.
- Check your local air quality online at www.njaqinow.net prior to burning wood. If the air quality in your area is poor, consider other heating alternatives.

State regulations and local ordinances in some municipalities prohibit the emission of visible smoke from outdoor wood boilers. These boilers heat a fluid that is circulated in homes and buildings for heating purposes. Under state regulations, these boilers may only emit visible smoke for three minutes every halfhour to allow for fire-starting.

When deciding how to heat your home this winter, consider upgrading to an EPA-certified wood stove or fireplace insert. The newer equipment will reduce air pollution and is much more energy efficient. To learn more, visit www.nj.gov/dep/baqp/ woodburning.html or www.epa.gov/burnwise.
