

We talk a lot about the importance of volunteerism in Califon - that selfless and donated time and energy that is the lifeblood of a small community. This is crucial, to be sure, but one does not need to volunteer for a position in order to contribute to out town; equally important are the simple dynamics of awareness and public discussion that inform our citizenry and leaders.

Why be informed? Why spend the time to come to a Town Council, Planning, or Board of Education meeting? There are dozens of decisions made every week in these types of meetings which directly or indirectly impact your life, property, and family. These meetings are advertised, open to the public, and normally scheduled in the evening hours - but are often poorly attended. The outcome of the decisions being made is greatly influenced by the input of the citizens of our town, and the ultimate health of our town is in many ways a product of our collective thinking. Our responsibility as citizens does not stop at the ballot box when we elect our leaders - truly effective leadership requires the ongoing input of the community. We are eager to hear your voice!

So as we enter the summer months and beyond, I'd encourage you to learn about the issues and opportunities facing our town, and become part of these conversations in their formal settings, beyond the backyard-and-BBQ discourse. The time required to scan an online agenda and attend an occasional meeting is not substantial, but the benefits to the town and yourself can be significant. Bring kids, too - a great way to learn about government on action!

Twitter (<u>www.twitter.com/califonboro</u>) - sign up for twitter and "follow" Califon Borough to receive updates regarding town events, notices, and meetings. Twitter also provides the ability for you to sign up to receive text messages regarding these notices.

Nixle (<u>www.nixle.com</u>) - register on Nixle to receive emergency emails and text messages from state and local police, fire, and OEM agencies.

Websites - there are numerous state, county, and local websites which contain valuable information. Two primary local websites on which key meeting dates, agendas, and minutes of interest are published are www.califonboro.net (municipal website) and www.califonschool.org (school website, including Board of Education information)

Lunch Bunch, available Monday - Thursday, is available for all students aged 3 and up who can stay an extra hour or come and hour early from 11:30am to 12:30pm. All have lunch together and then play with friends. Lunch Bunch is teacher supervised with emphasis on table manners and positive interactions.(Additional fees apply and limited space is available)

New this year is "Stay and Play" from 2:00-3:00pm on Monday and Wednesdays after PREPpy, your child would have the option of being at Happy Face for a full day.
